CHIEF RABBI'S COMMENT

The streets of Jerusalem are bristling with police and British soldiers and the tense atmosphere is described as the worst within memory of even veteran officers, states a message from the Holy City this afternoon. Police in the received an anonymous message this morning warning them that their headquarters is in danger. Latest figures for casualties of Monday's bomb outrage at the King David Hotel were: -52 killed, 42 wounded and 62 still missing-

still searching among the wreckage. The above figures were stated to be a true intimation of Monday's losses. A cowled Catholic priest and a British Army padre kept a daylight vigil at the rescue work.

Hundreds of soldiers worked four shifts throughout the night. To-day, the Chief Rabbi of Palestine condemned the bombing as "a dastardly crime which caused the loss of so many precious lives, including British, Arabs and Jews. It was the fruit, he added, of British efforts to peacefully solve the

As the funeral processions passed through the streets of Jerusalem on their way towards the various cemeteries, an atmosphere of gloom prevailed over the Holy City. All Arab shops were closed, and Arab traffic halted between noon and five o'clock as a protest strike against the attack. The Jewish community proclaimed a period of mourning. and all Jewish papers condemned the outrage.

In a report the C.E.O. stated that vigorous during the school year just ended, 165 of the students who attended the day classes in the City Vocational Schools had secured employment. From the Municipal Technical Institute a total of 102 boys and girls were placed in employment. One boy from this course had secured employment as a builder's clerk. from the engineering classes had obtained posts as apprentices to engineering, motor mechanics apprentices, apprentices to the Electricity Supply Board, to Coras Iompair Eireann and as youths intraining in the engineering branch of the Departmet of Posts and He was in Telegraphs.

From St. Anne's Vocational School 63 girls had secured employment during the year apprentices to tailoring and to dressmaking. A number of these girls were now in employment in Messrs. Lanigan Bros.-Concrete the Shoe Factory, Tobacco Factory and as shop assistants, waitresses, domestic servants and hair-

The Committee unanimously adopted the C.E.O.'s report, which they considered very satisfactory. Mr. Whelan paid a tribute to the

C.E.O.'s capabilities as an organiser and said he had given the Committee the finest and the most valuable service they could desire.

The C.E.O. said that the Committee's scheme, if it were to continue being a success, would have to be backed by the co-operation of both parents and children who were being provided with fine facilties for small cost.
