EVICITION SCENE

**Recalled By Recent
Death**

**"CROWBAR BRIGADE" HOTEL
RESISTED**

The death of Mrs. Patrick Hanly (formerly Alice Barry) which took place at her residence, Elton, Knocklong, recalls a stirring incident which took place during the Parnell period, when the agitation against landlordism was at its highest throughout the country (writes our Hospital correspondent).

The incident referred to was one in which Alice Barry (the late Mrs. Hanly) with the assistance of neighbours, offered forceful resistance to bailiffs and police, who had come to evict her from her holding on the O'Grady estate in the month of August, 1887.

THE "CROWBAR BRIGADE."

A crowd of about 300 people assembled for the eviction and, possession having been refused, bailiffs armed with crowbars, sledge hammers, hatchets and other weapons proceeded to batter down the house. Father Matt Ryan (deceased) as President of the Herbertstown Branch of the National League, came forward to make a settlement, which was rejected, and the bailiffs continued with their work. After a time the masonry began to give way before the onslaught and an opening was made.

At this juncture the defenders opened fire and rained stones, rocks and every available substance on the bailiffs and police. The police were ordered to fix bayonets and again charged the opening, but were repulsed by the men inside, who were armed with hayforks. In the latter encounter, Police Inspector Rice was stabbed in the jaw and the other constables injured in various ways.

An entrance was eventually effected and four men and the late Mrs. Hanly's sister, Julia Barry, were arrested.

FUNERAL OF MRS. HANLY.

The remains of the late Mrs. Hanly were removed to Knockainey Church and the funeral took place to Knocklong, where the interment was made. The clergy in attendance at office and Requiem Mass were:—Rev. Father Barry, Elton (cousin); Rev. Father O'Meara, C.C., Knockainey; Rev. Father Kennedy, C.C., Knocklong; Rev. Father M. O'Sullivan; Rev. Father J. O'Sullivan and Rev. Father T. O'Sullivan.

The chief mourners were:—Ellie, Mrs. Denihan, Mrs. Hickey (daughters), John (son), Thomas and Garret Barry (nephews).

ASKED TO LEAVE

**Request Leads To
Court Case**

**DEFENDANT FINED AND
BOUND OVER**

How a request to leave land taken for grazing led to trouble was described to District Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., at Shanagolden Court, on Wednesday.

John C. Power (21), labourer, Old Abbey, Shanagolden, was charged at the suit of the Attorney-General with assaulting William Tierney, at Old Abbey, on the 5th June. There was also an application by the Garda authorities to have the defendant bound to the peace, arising out of a further incident on the 13th July.

Inspector Byrnes prosecuted, and the defendant was not professionally represented.

ASKED THEM TO LEAVE

William Tierney, Old Abbey, Shanagolden, said that on the 5th June he was on Professor Wardell's land, where he had some grazing. He met defendant and John Cahill, and as they had previously caused damage to the fences, he asked them to leave. They refused, and when he said he would summon them, they said they didn't care about the Guards. At this stage Power wielded a stick over witness's head, but did not strike him. Then when witness was walking away defendant asked him to come back and fight, but witness continued on. Later, when witness was crossing his own field, at the other side of the road, defendant rushed at him and said he would have to fight. Defendant then gave him an open blow with a "crop," and hit him on the hand, which he put up to protect his head from the blow. Defendant also made another blow at him with the "crop" and struck a can which witness had in his hand. Defendant then ran away and said witness could now go for the Guards if he wished.

DEFENDANT INTERVIEWED

Sergeant Garvey said that following a report from Tierney, whose left wrist was swollen and bleeding from a wound, Power, when interviewed, admitted he was on the lands at Old Abbey. Tierney, he said, followed him and said he was not wanted on the lands and threatened to beat him. As a result of being abused, he (defendant) got vexed and hit Tierney on the jaw with his fist and also struck the can. He did not use a whip, and could not account for the wound on Tierney's wrist.

Sergeant Garvey added that he also took a statement from Cahill, who said he saw nothing on the occasion.
