

ADARE HOUSING

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MATTER REFERRED TO COUNTY MANAGER

At the last meeting of Limerick County Council, **Mr. Sean Hayes**, Chairman, presiding, **Senator Madden** asked why no provision was made in the housing survey for a scheme of new town houses for Adare. There was a very and increasing demand for dwellings in the village, and it was understood that Lord Dunraven did not propose to provide further houses.

The County Engineer (Mr. P. L. Mahan) said he did not know if Adare was not included in the survey, but it was not on the list supplied to him. It must have been assumed at the time that Lord Dunraven was providing for the housing needs of the village. **Senator Madden**—Now that this matter has been brought to light, I hope that steps will be taken forthwith to have a scheme of new houses provided at Adare.

Chairman—We will refer the matter to the County Manager and ask for a report for the next meeting.
