DEATH OF MR. E. J. BARRETT, BARNAGH

Widespread regret has been occasioned by the news of the death of Mr. Edmond J. Barrett, of Barnagh, Newcastle West, who passed away on the 6th inst. Deceased, who was aged about 57 years, belonged to a highly esteemed and widely respected West Limerick farming family, and his demise, which occurred with tragic suddenness, evoked deep sympathy amongst a wide circle of relatives and friends. Deceased, who leaves a widow and large family to mourn his passing, was father of Mr. John Barrett, home assistance officer, Newcastle West, and of Mr. Patrick Barrett, of the clerical staff of the Public Assistance Office, Newcastle West. He was brother-in-law of Mr. John J. King, chief officer, Public Health Department, Limerick Co. Council. Sincere sympathy will be extended to the bereaved widow, family and relatives.

The remains were removed to Monagea Parish Church on the 6th inst., and the funeral, which took place to the adjoining cemetery on the following day, was attended by a very large and representative gathering. CERTIFICATE OF IRISH NATIONALITY.

A certificate of Irish nationality has been granted to Hans Kay Jorgensen, Belfield Lodge, Limerick.

DEATH RATES.

A recently published inventory of deaths from all causes in the larger cities in Eire, shows that during the past four weeks 13.4 per thousand of the population of Limerick died. The death rate in Limerick during the past week was 12.4 per thousand of the population.

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
