Trying To Rescue Boy

COMMENDED BRAVERY CORONER

That death was due to asphyxia following accidental drowning was the verdict of Deputy-Coroner J. S. McNeice, solr., at an inquest on Wednesday evening into the death of Denis Barry (5), Park View House, Pery Street, Limerick, who fell into the Shannon at Barrington's Pier on Monday afternoon and was dead on admission to Barrington's Hospital shortly afterwards

Christopher Nash 48 Pennywell, said he was working in the vicinity of Barrington's Pier at about 1.15 p.m. on Monday last, when he heard a little girl shouting. man came up to him and asked where he could get a telephone and told witness there was a child in the river. Witness immediately rushed to the Pier and saw a boy in the water about 150 yards away. He dived in and recovered the boy, catching the coat to hold the victim up. When he reached the bank witness was exhausted and he saw a group take the boy, who appeared to be dead, to hospital in an ambulance.

Mr. P. Barry, father of the deceased boy, said his son was five years of age. The boy's sister, Una, and brother, Paddy, left their home d only with deceased on Monday afternoon th the to take a 'bus ride to Barrington's maids' accommodation, and some court case it Pier. Later, he was informed that other Paddy had fallen into the Shannon and had been removed by ambulance to Barrington's Hospital. evening he saw and identified the body of his son, who had hitherto enjoyed good health.

Dr. Frank Crowe, house surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, deposed that on August 19th last he examined the body of deceased in the hospital. The boy, who was dead on admission, died of asphyxia, following immersion in water.

The Coroner and Supt. Colleran, who represented the Garda, complimented Christopher Nash on his very plucky action in his attempted rescue. It was a great pity, said the Coroner, that Mr. Nash was not nearer the scene of the tragedy.

Coroner and Mr. thanked the Garda for their assistance in connection with the accident.
