BILBERRIES DISCOVERED

A great new belt of bilberries has been discovered on a mountain top near the village of Kilfinane, and hundreds of men, women and children are going there daily. The berries, which are unusually large, are exported daily in baskets by merchants to England, and the price paid to pickers is 1/9 to 2/3 a pound. One family of three made £7 in one day.

FIVE KILLED IN AIR CRASH

When an Egyptian Air Lines 'plane crashed on the Suez Road, 33 miles from Almaza Aerodrome last night, five passengers, three of them British, were killed. The pilot and two other passengers were injured. The 'plane was bound from Lydda, Palestine, to Cairo, and the cause of the crash is unknown.

MAY LAST UNTIL NOVEMBER
