FATAL ACCIDENT

CRUSHED TO DEATH

As the result of a tragic accident, an employee of C.I.E.—Mr. Patrick O'Neill, aged 60 years—lost his life at Miltown Malbay Railway Station last night.
 The deceased lived in Janesboro', Limerick, with his wife and family up to 1941, when he was transferred to Ennis for operations on the West Clare railway system. He was employed by Coras Iompair Eireann as an engine driver and happened to be in Limerick on Saturday night.
 Yesterday afternoon he drove the excursion train from Limerick to Lahinch over the West Clare section from Ennis, where he boarded the locomotive. As there is no turntable at Lahinch he had to reverse the engine to Miltown-Malbay in order to turn. While standing on the running-board during this operation, he was caught between the engine and the wall of the station store-room and was badly crushed. He died some time later.
 He is survived by his widow and five children.
