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## A GREAT PRIEST

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### DEATH OF CANON FOLEY

It is with deep regret that we  
record the death of Very Rev.  
James Canon Foley, P.P., Dromcol-  
logher, which occurred in the  
Parochial House on Saturday after  
a long illness.

The late Canon Foley, who was  
born at Knockea, in the parish of  
Donoughmore, was ordained 55  
years ago at Maynooth. He served  
as curate at Bandon, Kinsale and  
Blackrock (Cork), and on his recall  
to the Limerick Diocese was appoin-  
ted curate at Knockaderry and sub-  
sequently at Croom and Glin. He  
was appointed Parish Priest of  
Knockaderry, where he spent twelve  
years. Following this he became  
Parish Priest of Dromcollogher  
some ten years ago. For some time  
Canon Foley was in failing health  
and his death was not unexpected.  
His ever-kindly manner as well as  
his great priestly zeal endeared him  
to his parishioners, not alone at  
Dromcollogher but also in those  
other parts of the diocese where he  
had ministered, and his passing is  
deeply regretted by priests and  
people.

a full complement of passengers.

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### ALL OCCUPANTS DEAD

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Posted as missing on Friday, the  
Naval air ambulance was found late  
yesterday on Mickledore Crags, the  
highest summit in England. It was  
completely wrecked, with both  
wings torn off and all five occu-  
pants dead. The wreckage had been  
seen from an aeroplane. The bodies  
were brought down the steep moun-  
tain last night for removal to a  
Naval air station.

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### YACHT SUNK IN COLLISION.

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While competing in the Royal  
Alfred Yacht Club's Corinthian  
match in Dublin Bay on Saturday,  
two yachts collided, one craft, the  
Nepenthe, sinking almost imme-  
diately. The Nepenthe's crew were  
all taken safely aboard the Blue  
Trout, with which the craft had  
collided.
