PUBLIC ASSISTANCE (FOOTWEAR REGULATIONS) ORDER, 1944.

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with the terms of above Order, Limerick County Council, acting as Public Assistance Authority for the County Health District of Limerick, may provide footwear by way of assistance in kind for children up to the age of 16 years residing in the County Health District of Limerick, whose parents or guardians satisfy the Council that they are unable out of their own resources to provide the full cost of footwear at current prices.

CLASSES PROVIDED FOR.

Children of:—
(a) Persons in receipt of Home Assistance. (Vouchers for members of this class will be for the full cost of the footwear).

(b) Persons not in receipt of Home Assistance who are in a position to:—

(1) Make a contribution towards the cost of the official footwear.

(2) Pay in full the retail price of the official footwear.

Prices for footwear will be those fixed for the purposes of this Order.

Application forms may be obtained from the local Assistance Officer and these, when completed, should be returned to the undersigned not later than 14th September, 1946.

Applications received after that date will not be considered.

Late Canon Foley

LOSS TO DIOCESE

It is with deep regret that we record the death of Very Rev. James Canon Foley, P.P., Dromcollogher, which occurred in the Parochial House on Saturday after a long illness.

The late Canon Foley, who was born at Knockea, in the parish of Donoughmore, was ordained 55 years ago at Maynooth. He served as curate at Bandon, Kinsale and Blackrock (Cork), and on his recall to the Limerick Diocese was appointed curate at Clounagh and subsequently at Croom and Glin. From Glin he was appointed Parish Priest of Clounagh, where he spent twelve years. Following this he became Parish Priest of Dromcollogher some ten years ago. For some time Canon Foley was in failing health and his death was not unexpected. His ever-kindly manner as well as his great priestly zeal endeared him to his parishioners, not alone at Dromcollogher but also in those other parts of the diocese where he had ministered, and his passing is deeply regretted by priests and people.

An outstanding trait in his character was his love for children. It was his wish that collectively they should always take a prominent part in the various religious ceremonies. He looked with much favour on the establishment of St. Mary's Secondary School, and under his guidance a Parochial Hall was erected at Dromcollogher, while in the church grounds at Broadford and Dromcollogher he erected two beautiful statues of Christ The King, one of which now serves as a fitting monument to his mortal remains.

THE OBSEQUIES.

The Lord Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. O'Neill, presided at the Office and Solemn Requiem High Mass in Dromcollogher Church on Tuesday. The interment subsequently took place in the church grounds amidst many manifestations of genuine regret and sorrow.

There were over fifty priests in the sanctuary, while the church was packed to capacity by the people of the parish, who were deeply attached to their late beloved pastor.

The celebrant of the Requiem Mass was Rev. J. Dillon, P.P., Cardiff, Wales (nephew); deacon, Rev. J. White, Adm., St. Michael's, Limerick; sub-deacon, Rev. Dr. P. Fitzgerald, and master of ceremonies, Rev. M. J. Kelly, C.C., Newcastle West.
