DIED IN SYDNEY

The death of Dr. John T. Mc-
Donnell in Sydney, New South
Wales, will be learned with re-
gret in his native city and condol-
ence offered to his brother and
sister, Dr. Charles McDonnell and
Mrs. Hessian. He was the young-
est son of the late Ald. Patrick
McDonnell, High Sheriff of Lime-
rick in 1903. After reading a brill-
iant course at Edinburgh
University, he entered into prac-
tice in England, where he spent a
few years before proceeding to
Australia and making his home in
Sydney, the residence of many
Limerick emigrants. In that city
Dr. McDonnell acquired an exten-
sive practice as an eminent sur-
geon.
