## DEATH OF ARCHBISHOP HARTY

We deeply regret to announce the death of his Grace, the Most Rev. Dr. John Harty, Archbishop of Cashel and Emly, which took place on Wednesday night at the Archbishop's Palace, Thurles, following a long illness.

Born at Knocknagurteeny, Murroe, Co. Limerick, in 1867, the late Archbishop received his early education in the local schools, and later began his classical studies at the Crescent College, Limerick. Entering the Diocesan Seminary, Thurles, in his 18th year, he completed his rhetoric and humanity courses, and went to St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, two years later. Here he had an exceptionally brilliant career, being the acknowledged leader of his class.

Among the messages of sympathy received is a telegram from Most Rev. Dr. O'Neill, Bishop of Limerick.
