LATE MONSIGNOR SCULLY

Mr. James L. Scully, Chapel St., Newcastle West, brother of the late Right Rev. Monsignor Scully, who died recently in the United States, writes to state that his brother did not pass away in Chicago, or collapsed and die in his studio, as reported.

Mr. Scully writes:—
"The Monsignor took suddenly ill in his office at the printing plant of the Western Catholic newspaper, of which he was publishing editor, in the City of Quincy, U.S.A. He was removed to the Parish Rectory, where he died later. As I am writing, I have before me a letter from the Bishop of the Diocese, Most Rev. James A. Griffin, D.D., conveying the sad news of my brother's death. Also numerous other letters of sympathy from the different priests who knew him. Note—The City of Quincy is about 400 miles from Chicago. He spent three months holiday with me in Ballygran in 1924, although your correspondent stated that he paid his last visit in 1922."
