BARREL OF "WASH"

HIDDEN IN BANK OF STREAM

A number of Guards from Ballina, Co. Mayo, in charge of Inspector Cahill, raided the Glencullen Mountains, Ballycastle, North Mayo, on the border of the Atlantic, and after intensive search discovered a barrel of "wash" hidden in the bank of a mountain stream on land the property of Anthony Dunleavy, farmer.

He was prosecuted at Ballycastle Court on Friday.

Inspector Cahill gave evidence of the finding of the "wash" within 200 yards of Dunleavy's house. He also found two barrel holes within

Justice—Mr. Kelly, it is bad enough for me to have to deal with cranky litigants and not to have to deal with cranky solicitors.

Mr. O'B. Kelly—I'm not the first solicitor that couldn't put up with you.

Briefly announcing that he was dismissing the action, the Justice left the Bench as the business was concluded.

WALKED OUT

TWO FREED NAZIS

Two freed Nazi leaders, Herrs Schacht and Fritsche, walked from Nuremberg Jail, in pouring rain, this morning to collect their identity cards at the local bureau. Schacht is ready to go to Stuttgart, where he intends to reside.

Eric Raeder, ex-Commander-in-Chief of the German Navy, who was sentenced to life imprisonment, has filed a plea to have the sentence altered to one of death by shooting. Now that he has passed the age of 70 years, the plea states, he would not be able to stand up to the rigours of life imprisonment. It has been signed by ten former grand admirals of the German Navy.

Seyss-Inquart, sentenced to death at the Nuremberg Trial, to-day sent a message to Queen Wilhelmina, Holland, to support his plea for clemency.

GAMING ACT PLEADED

The Gaming Act was pleaded at Limerick Civil Bill Court to-day, before Mr. J. M. Flood, B.L., D.J., when Luke J. Larkin, 14, Catherine Street, Limerick, sued Jas. Hyland, Caherelly, Grange, for £10, being, it was alleged, the amount due for commission executed with the defendant on December 10th last, in respect of a greyhound which ran at the Limerick Greyhound Track.

James O'Dwyer, an employee of Larkin, gave evidence of the defendant having incurred the liability in respect of which a civil bill was eventually issued. That £10 was still due to his employer.

Mr. Martin Tynan, solicitor, who defended, intimated that he had been instructed "specifically to raise the Gaming Act."

Justice—I am sure you would not do it on your own.

Mr. Tynan replied that he was only carrying out his instructions.
