## BOY DROWNED

### In Mulcair River

#### BRAVE RESCUE EFFORTS FAIL

A ramble out Plassy way by a group of boys from the Clare Street area on yesterday afternoon in quest of hazel nuts had a tragic sequel when John Creagh, aged 13 years, residing at 54 Old Clare St., Limerick, lost his life as a result of a drowning accident, at approximately 6 o'clock.

It appears that the sad occurrence took place at a point where the Mulcair and Shannon rivers meet—one mile from Plassy and four miles from the city. The boys were in the act of crossing the river by walking along the reservoir pipes which span the river when the deceased slipped and toppled into the water. His brother, Stephen, aged 14, immediately went to his aid by jumping off the pipes, fully clothed, and swam for 75 yards, grasping the brother, but his attempted rescue was foiled, as a strong current was running.

Then another companion, named Devereaux, dived in, but the force of the current swept him away and he was in a state of exhaustion and in grave danger of drowning when a number of young men boating in the vicinity came on the scene and effected a timely rescue. However, John Creagh had disappeared in a few minutes and the alarm was raised. Despite the efforts of other persons who arrived at the spot, the body was not recovered.

The Gardai were informed of the tragedy and some members of the Force stationed at Castleconnell carried out dragging operations, which continued up to the time of going to press.

Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents in their great sorrow.

### Meetings of Infirmary Committee

#### MATTER BEFORE COUNTY COUNCIL

At Saturday's meeting of Limerick County Council, Mr. Martin O'Dwyer, Chairman, presiding,

Mr. Fitzsimons asked the Co. Manager (Mr. P. J. Meghen) how much the Council were contributing towards the maintenance of the Co. Infirmary. He asked why the Press were not admitted to meetings of such an important body as the Co. Infirmary Committee.

"When I came first the Press were always at the meetings of the County Infirmary Committee," Mr. Fitzsimons said. "But after being about a year elected the Press were cut out. It is a very important institution at the present time and the Press should be admitted."

#### QUESTION FOR INFIRMARY COMMITTEE.

Mr. O'Donnell—That is a question entirely for the Co. Infirmary Committee.

Mr. McCarthy—We have power to get the Press in.

Mr. O'Donnell (to Mr. Fitzsimons)—We got the Press in; you put them out.

Mr. Fitzsimons—I didn't put them out.

Mr. McCarthy—The change of members put them out.

Mr. Dore—On a point of order. Is the Co. Infirmary Committee a subsidiary body of the Co. Council?

Manager—No.

Mr. Dore—If it is not is it in order for us to discuss it?

When Mr. Fitzsimons insisted that the matter should be discussed, Mr. O'Donnell said to him:—"You were a member of the Committee when they were put out."

Mr. Fitzsimons—I wasn't there when the Press were put out.

Mr. Dore—How can you discuss the affairs of a Committee which is not a subsidiary body of this Council?
