bhaill. Eamon was of a family that  
gave outstanding service to the  
cause of freedom in the '16-'22 per-  
iod. This was, of course, but the  
logical outcome of a life imbued  
with the advanced national ideals  
that he, Sean, and members of the  
family held.

"They shall be remembered for  
ever" is truly said of all in that  
long list of martyrs who suffered  
torture and death in the past for  
Ireland's sake. In this connection  
I would wish to pay a sincere tri-  
bute to Eamon's memory, for he  
was one of the faithful but too few.

When the "Black and Tan" ter-  
ror was at its worst in 1921, I and  
a few others were seized by these  
mercenaries and put through all  
the rigours of day and night tor-  
ture that they knew so well how  
to carry out. In face of this, how-  
ever, Eamon O Cearbhaill was the  
man that filled the part created by  
my arrest unflinchingly.

To-day, looking back to those  
days, we regret the passing of so  
many of "our bravest and best." We  
regret in particular the demise of  
Eamon, who was a sincere and true
