WORK ON ROADS

And Recent Flood Damage

ACTING CO. SURVEYOR'S REPORT

At the meeting of Limerick County Council on Saturday, Mr. Martin O'Dwyer, Chairman, presiding. The Acting Co. Surveyor (Mr. J. F. Ambrose) presented the following interesting report on the progress of the road work scheme...

DAMAGE BY FLOODS.

"Taking into consideration the very wet summer and the adverse effect the wet had on the county roads, the condition, generally, of the roads is fairly satisfactory. The floods which occurred on the 11th and 12th of August last, and again on the 20th September, did very considerable damage to roads and bridges...

"The total amount of money expended to date on road and bridge flood damage is £670 14s. 11d., which is practically the full amount of damage caused. The repairs to the banks of the several rivers which were destroyed by the floods entailed a very great amount of labour and heavy expenditure, and to date cost £1,225 18s. 7d. Most of the bad breaches with our drainage area, and one or two outside our area, have now been repaired and made as safe as possible without the help of machinery.

"Two Board of Works Engineers who visited the county and inspected the several breaches have promised to send on a dredger to clean up the bed of the Bilbao River above and below the 'Blackboy Bridge'. They have estimated the amount necessary to repair all the breaches and defects on the several river banks.

HELP AT HARVEST WORK.

"Every possible help was given to farmers during the harvesting emergency. There were approximately 5,000 man-days given to farmers throughout the county, and the work done by the Council workmen was generally praised by the farmers. The cost to the Council of this work was approximately £2,152 9s. 1d.

"As regards turf production, the work started very slowly owing to the shortage of labour, but during the month of June there was a large amount of turf cut. Unfortunately, the weather broke before the greater part of the turf was saved, and out of 8,200 tons cut (some 200 tons more than was cut last year), approximately 6,000 tons are still in the bogs, and probably will have to remain there until early next year.

EFFECTIVE ASSISTANCE FOR FARMERS.

Mr. McCarthy said that every individual in West Limerick was thankful for the help given by the Co. Surveyor and the Co. Council labourers during the period of saving the harvest. Mr. Dore proposed a vote of congratulation to Mr. Ambrose for the very effective way he had assisted farmers over a most difficult period.

Wednesday, October 30th Cattle. Substantial increase in entries, and a fair average class. Good attendance, including shipping and local interests. Small entry of beef, no really prime heifers and bullocks on offer; neatly done small heifers and bullocks were in good demand at late rates, also fresh heiferish cows. Fat cows steadily placed at current rates; secondary and older sorts also in fair request. In the store cattle section trade was much brighter; the entry in this section included a useful selection of forward store bullocks, which were wanted and met good trade, the right stamp changed hands readily at advanced rates. Coloury dairy heifers were also in keen demand. In the young store cattle section trade showed an improvement over recent depressed markets, and useful well-bred stores of the right stamp met fair enquiry at better rates; backward and plain cattle hard to negotiate. A substantial volume of business transacted and a particularly good clearance effected. Fat heifers and bullocks, small, £20 to £25. Fat cows, £19 10s. to £26 15s.; second run, £13 15s. to £18. Old, £7 15s. to £12 10s. 25 year old bullocks and heifers, £19 15s. to £23 5s.; second run, £16 10s. to £8. 12 year old bullocks and heifers, best, £13 to £14 10s.; second run, £10 15s. to £11 5s.

This description found ready and willing purchasers, with a quick sale and spirited competition. Business was marked with a steady and active demand for choice dairy cows and anything with such qualifications was readily bought up, top prices being paid. Promising and well-bred medium-sized heifers in better demand. Rough and poor heifers still difficult to cash, unless at low prices. Business in the cow section wore a brighter aspect and to end of the day moved in an active groove. This section of the market was easily the best for some time, and advanced rates being readily obtainable for choice cows, more could easily have been sold. Top price for calved dairy cows went to Mr. H. Lyons, Corcamore, Clarina, at £39 10s., the runner-up being Mr. John Cagney, Tuagh, Adare, at £34. For in-calf cows, Mr. E. 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OBITUARY

MR. P. J. LEAHY, HOSPITAL. Widespread regret has been occasioned by the death, which occurred suddenly on Sunday, 20th October, of Mr. Patrick J. Leahy, Bank Place, Hospital. Deceased, who was walking to Mass, was suddenly taken ill. He received the last rites of the Church while still conscious and passed peacefully to his reward shortly afterwards. The news of his death cast a gloom over the town, as he was a well-known and prominent figure, and was connected with the business and social life of the town for many years. His gentlemanly qualities, his quiet and patient disposition, and, above all, his generosity and kindness to the poor, won for him the love and loyalty of all who knew him. He was greatly respected and esteemed by all classes, and his unexpected demise came as a shock to the people of the town and surrounding locality.

A native of Bottonstown, Elton, the late Mr. Leahy came of a well-known and long-established East Limerick family. As a young man, he filled a teaching appointment at Croon National Schools, later taking up an appointment in Barry, Gloucestershire, where for many years he taught in St. Helen's Schools. While in Wales he was President of the Barry St. Vincent de Paul Society, and he was also a member of the Third Order of Francis Minor.

On his return from Wales, after his retirement from teaching, the late Mr. Leahy took a deep interest in the Muintir na Tire Organisation and was, in fact, one of the pioneers of the organisation. He was one of the promoters of the Muintir na Tire Guild formed in Hospital and since its formation was secretary of the Guild. As secretary of the organisation he got alone carried out the duties of a secretary but did his utmost to promote the interests of the Guild and Branch of an organisation which had his whole-hearted support. He also held the position of District Officer of the Irish Red Cross Society and was, in addition, secretary of, and instructor to, the local Branch of the I.R.C.S.

Business was suspended in the town and all shops and business premises closed during the removal of the remains to St. John's Parish Church on Monday evening, 21st October. The funeral was one of the largest seen to pass through the town and was a fitting tribute to the memory of the deceased. Office and Requiem Mass were celebrated on the following morning, after which the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of a very large and widely representative attendance.

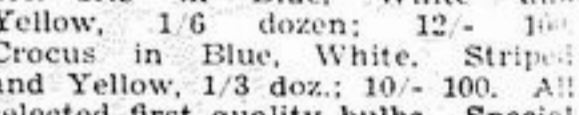
