DEATH OF MR. WILLIAM O'BRIEN

The death of Mr. William O'Brien, which took place at his residence, New Street, Limerick, last week, has removed a very popular figure. The deceased, son of the late Mr. Michael O'Brien, who was a Relieving Officer under the old Board of Guardians, was connected with the tobacco trade since his youth. Though retiring and reticent, he had numerous friends, for all who came into contact with him realised at once that he was a man of deep sincerity, honesty and integrity.

The late Mr. O'Brien took a great interest in chess. Twenty-five years ago he was instrumental in founding the Limerick Club, and though he was not himself a great player, he was a most enthusiastic one. When the Club had been founded he induced the great Russian master, Bojoligo, to come to Limerick to give lessons to the members.

The funeral to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery from St. Michael's Church was very largely attended, there being a full muster of the members of the Chess Club. Very deep sympathy is tendered to his children in their great bereavement.
