The Very Rev. Anthony Canon Humphreys, of Parochial House, Knockaney, Hospital, Co. Limerick, who died on August 19th, 1944, left estate in England and Ireland valued at £7,737. Probate has been granted to his brothers, Dr. Aloysius Humphreys, of the City Home and Hospital, Limerick, and Dr. Joseph Humphreys, of Rosmadda, near Limerick. He left his effects to his brothers and sisters; £100 for Masses; £100 for repairs to the Cathedral of Cashel; £25 to the Catholic Church, Murroe; £25 for the poor of his parish, and £25 for the poor of the parishes of Murroe and Boher; £40 to his housekeeper, if still in his service, and the residue for charitable purposes in the Archdioceses of Cashel and Emly.

HELD MEDAL FOR BRAVERY

The late R. N. John Francis Fitz-Gerald, who died recently of illness contracted during war service, was educated at The O'Brien Institute, Dublin, and later studied at the Atlantic College, Leeson Park. A student of culture and great promise, he qualified in 1943, at the age of 17 years, for service as Radio Officer with the Merchant Navy. The following year he was presented with his Majesty's Medal for bravery. He was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank C. Fitz-Gerald, Abington House, Murroe, and grandson of the late Mr. John C. and Mrs. Abjohu Fitz-Gerald, who owned considerable property at Thurles, Co. Tipperary, and Pallasgreen, Co. Limerick, including "Sunville," "Landscape," and Pallas House, where his great-grandfather, the late Mr. Michael Fitz-Gerald, kept a noted pack and bred and raced many famous horses.
