WEEK'S WORK.—WINTER PRUNING.

A beginning should now be made on the fruit trees as soon as all the leaves have fallen off them, and it is a good plan to start on the wall trees. It is a very cold job nailing and tying these in, and if done now there is still a chance of a warm day or two to do them.

In pruning espallier-trained pear and apple trees, the tips or leaders of the main branches should be cut back about one-third of last summer's growth, and all the side shoots and breast wood should be cut back hard to two or three buds of the bases of the young wood. Some of the old spurs, where they are two thick or worn out, especially in the older parts of the trees where they have not fruited well for the past few years, should be cut out altogether.

In dealing with a young espallier-trained tree that has not attained the full height of the wall, the top or middle leader must be cut back to within approximately 12 to 15 ft. of the last pair of branches. In doing this one must be careful to select three well placed buds to cut to. These buds should be approximately the above mentioned distance from the last horizontal
