## WRECKED 'PLANE

### SURVIVORS NOT YET LOCATED

Since 9.30 o'clock last night no news has been received from the survivors of the wrecked "Dakota" passenger plane, which crashed in the Alps this week. It is presumed that the aircraft lies 10,500 feet above sea level at Brig, Switzerland, near Mont Blanc. Search parties are still on the look out for the survivors, and these have been joined by parachutists. With bitter weather brought about by blizzards, prevailing last night, it is feared that the survivors could hardly hold out for a further 24 hours.

Late last night a French pilot reported that he had seen the U.S. 'plane at a spot which was four or five miles south-west of Mont Blanc, in Italian territory. The French pilot at that time was in radio communication with the survivors.

## FOUND DEAD IN BED

Mr. John O'Connor, retired carpenter, of Church Street, Newcastle West, was found dead in bed on Friday morning of last week. Deceased, who was over 70 years, was about as usual on the previous evening. Neighbours became alarmed when he did not make an appearance in the morning and an entry was gained by forcing the front door. ### GARDA FOUND GUILTY

In the Central Criminal Court, Green Street, Dublin, yesterday (Thursday), before Mr. Justice Overend, Daniel Joseph Duff (23), Civic Guard, a native of Suncroft, Co. Kildare, was found guilty of the murder of Guard James Byrne, at the farm of Mr. R. J. Kennedy, near Pallas, on the night of the 25th September last.

The jury added an unanimous recommendation to mercy.

The date of the execution was fixed for Wednesday, December 11th.
