WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, November 27th—Less cattle than last week, but a full seasonable supply, and a good class. Big attendance, and full muster of buyers, both home and shipping. Smaller proportion of beef and strong cattle, market for which opened firm, medium weights of nice quality, especially heifers in steady demand at top rates; full currencies easily maintained, and for prime animals a turn in favour of vendors; best run of cows readily cashed, older and secondary sorts for canning met brisk sale at late rates. All round demand for beef was firm, and a complete clearance almost effected; forward and aged cattle with quality and condition steady sale at recent values. Best drafts of polly bullocks met brisk competition, and were steadily negotiated around last week's terms; feeding and dairy heifers met fair competition and sale. In young store cattle section trade was somewhat quieter, except for choice drafts of bullocks, and colour roan dairy heifers, which changed hands satisfactorily, and promising young store cattle with condition met fair selling trade, backward and plain types tedious and difficult to sell. Exceptionally good clearance.

Fat heifers and bullocks, £23 15s. to £27 15s.; second run, £20 to £23; fat cows, best, £21 15s. to £25 5s.; second run, £17 to £20; old, £6 10s. to £16 10s. 2 1/2 year old bullocks and heifers, £21 10s. to £27 15s.; 1 1/2 year old bullocks and heifers, £13 10s. to £17 5s.; second run, £7 17s. 6d. to £12 10s.; calves, small, £5 to £6 12s. 6d. Sheep—Numbers showed a decrease on last week, but a slightly better class in general. Usual attendance. Choice pens including heavy sheep met firm trade and good competition; well meated and nicely bred hoggets freely bid for, in demand and wanted, but for sheep short of condition demand not as active. Young fresh ewes a fair trade; store hoggets quiet, and hard to turn into money, unless at slightly lower rates. Small supply of lambs, which met a quiet demand; rates for prime fat sheep firmer than last week. Market well cleared. Fat middle weight, 130/- to 143/-; hoggets, best, 138/- to 149/-; second run, 120/- to 135/-; small, 101/- to 117/-; lambs, best, 86/- to 90/-; small, 56/-.—Wm. B. Fitt & Co., auctioneers.

WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, November 26th—Full seasonable entry, substantial increase on last week, and included a fair number of choice and promising cows and heifers; on the whole class not up to last Tuesday. An exceptionally strong attendance, with shipping interests fully represented. Trade was strong and active for cows showing promise of proving good milchers, and anything with such qualifications were readily bought up at advanced rates, customers attending specially for this class, and more could have been sold; ordinary and secondary cows were also in steady demand at satisfactory rates. In the heifer section the best entry for some time, and included a fair proportion of really high-class heifers, which were in strong request at substantially advanced rates. Rain-storm made trading disagreeable. Slow demand reflected anxiety for winter and spring fodder. Calves, under nine months, led to sales of the better kind mostly, with few exceeding £6 from £4. Best of the 1 1/2-year-olds did not exceed £13; 2-year-old bullock stores, £9 to £13; 3-year-old calves, £16 to £22; old "can" cows, £8 to £15; springers, £18 to £28. Bonhams (about 300), £3 5s. to £4 15s.; few stores went £5 to £5 5s.
