

£235, plus £11 15s. auctioneer's fees. Plaintiff had also the defendant's deposit of £5 which had been forfeited.

Remarking that the claim was "a very patchy one," the Justice dismissed it, and allowed the defendant £3 expenses.

Limerick County Council will
hold a special meeting at the Co.
Home, Newcastle West, on Satur-
day week, 7th December, to con-
sider problems arising out of the
administration of the Institution

pondent). Since the Council held a
similar meeting last year, a num-
ber of much-needed improvements
have been carried out in the Home,
including the painting and renovat-
ing of the female department.
Other works still to be carried out
include the reconstruction of the
boiler house. On the same occa-

proceed with the housing scheme
at Castleview, where it is proposed
to acquire an excellent site.
