HOTEL LICENCE

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FOR COUNTRY MANSION

At Limerick Circuit Court last Friday, before Judge Barra O Briain, S.C.,

Mr. Sean Kenny, B.L. (instructed by Mr. A. Blood-Smyth, solr.), mentioned the application of Thomas Norris Russell Browning, Carass Court, Croom, for a hotel licence in respect of his home at Carass Court, which had been adjourned at the previous sitting of the Court.

Mr. Kenny reminded his Lordship that when the application for the hotel licence had come before him previously, his Lordship had adjourned it for the production of an I.T.A. certificate in respect of the new hotel. The applicant was seeking a licence in respect of his house, which was a country mansion. If the licence were granted, Mr. Browning meant to accommodate tourists.

The applicant, Thomas Norris Russell Browning, swore that he was now in possession of a hotel certificate from the I.T.A. in respect of his premises at Carass Court. When the application came before the Court previously, the house was not fully furnished. It was now fully furnished and was ready for the accommodation of guests.

Mr. Michael O'B. Kelly, solr. said he represented Mr. J. J. Power, State Solicitor, who opposed the application previously. Mr. Power had now no objection to the granting of the licence.

His Lordship granted the application.
