His old comrades of G Company, 4th Battalion, West Limerick Brigade, I.R.A., had a Requiem Mass celebrated for the repose of the soul of the late Edward T. O'Keeffe, Kilmihill, Ballingarry, on Thursday morning of last week by An Canonac Tomas de Bhall, S.P. Deceased was Captain of the local company of the I.R.A. during the glorious days of the fight for independence, and after being on the run for some time was arrested and interned in Spike Island until the general release at the truce. His father passed away during his detention there, and he would not be allowed to attend the funeral except under humiliating conditions, which he refused to accept. He was also a prominent member of the Croom Republican District Council until the dissolution of that body. He was most popular with his old comrades, and indeed with everyone with whom he was acquainted, and his untimely and very unexpected death caused deep and widespread regret, his bereaved family having received messages of sympathy from all parts of the county, as well as many from outside its borders.
