WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, December 11th—Cattle—Much heavier market than last week in both departments; substantial entries and a better class, with more fat and strong cattle, and many useful drafts of nice quality stores. Strong and representative attendance of buyers, home and shipping interests fully represented. Beef met a steady selling trade, especially prime fat heifers and bullocks, handy weights being in brisk demand, and touched top current rates. Fresh young beef cows steadily placed at full values, secondary sorts and those suitable for culling in large numbers and met brisk trade at previous rates; aged and forward bullocks in fair enquiry, and sold reasonably well, with prices slightly easier. In young store cattle section business was quiet, severe weather conditions affecting trade. However, there was steady enquiry for top lots, particularly choice one-and-a-half-year old bullocks and heifers, previous full terms being paid; quality and condition had buyers, but this and secondary lots met a much slower trade, and difficult to cash unless at reduced rates. No calves on offer. Particularly good clearance effected in beef and cow department, and fair clearance in store section. Fat heifers, £24 5s. to £28 10s.; second run, £21 to £24. Fat cows, best, £24 to £26 15s.; second run, £19 10s. to £22 15s.; old, £6 to £16 15s. 2 1/2 year old bullocks and heifers, £22 to £26 10s. 1 1/2 year old bullocks and heifers, best, £14 to £21; second run, £8 to £13 10s.

Sheep—Substantial increase in entries, all pens being filled, and a very useful selection to draw from, including many pens of prime quality. Strong attendance. Trade wore a brisk aspect throughout the day, starting firm and kept going to the end; prime sheep in strong demand and quickly placed; also well fed wethers and hoggets with quality wanted and readily cashed. Sheep short of condition, demand not quite as active, all round last week's rates easily obtainable, prime sheep are wanted. Young fresh ewes good selling trade. Trade steady around previous level for store sheep, but enquiry for feeding sheep is easing with the advancing season. Small supply of fat and store lambs, which were in good demand. Business finished up strong, with a good sell up, and the highest turnover for some time. Annual Xmas market next Wednesday, December 18th, at 11 o'clock. GOT BIG POST IN NEW ZEALAND

Mr. Thomas P. J. Twomey, who at present is Technical Adviser to a group of over 40 Dairy and Creamery Companies in the North of England, is shortly leaving to take up an important post under the Department of Agriculture in New Zealand. A native of Cork, he is son of the General Manager and Secretary of the wholesale firm of Messrs. J. McCarthy and Sons, Ltd., Cork, and is married to a daughter of the late William Russell, of Ballinacorney, Kilmohony, Mitchelstown. His new position involves responsibility for the design, erection, equipping, staffing and control of all Pasteurized Milk and Bottling Dairies throughout New Zealand. These are to be established in all the cities and large towns in the Dominion, and will be operated by the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Twomey graduated from U.C.C. in Dairy Science in 1932, and after a few years in various creameries at home joined the English Milk Marketing Board in 1937 as Assistant Manager in their Creamery at Camborne, Cornwall. After two years there he was appointed Manager of their largest Creamery in England at Norwich, Norfolk, which position he relinquished to become Technical Adviser to a group of over 40 Dairy and Creamery Companies in the North of England, controlled by Southwick's Wholesale Dairies, Ltd., Hull.
