FOR THE CASTLECONNELL FOOTBRIDGE

In connection with the proposal
or the Co. Council to take over the
footbridge at Castleconnell, which
had been erected and used by the
Defence Forces during the emer-
gency, the **County Manager** reported
to the meeting of that body held
at Newcastle West that he had
asked the Deputies for Limerick
to take the matter up with
the responsible department. In this
connection he had been asked to in-
crease the offer already made by
the Council for the acquisition of
the bridge. He understood that the
Department of Defence would be
more agreeable to this proposition.
Originally the Department had
asked for a contribution of £850, and
he now suggested that the Council's
contribution be increased by £200
which, he believed, would be accept-
able to the Department. He would
be glad, therefore, if the Council
approved of this offer.

On the proposition of **Mr. Michael
Hickey**, seconded by **Senator D. J.
Madden**, the Council unanimously
approved of the suggested offer of
£200 increase.

AN OCTOGENARIAN PASSES AWAY

The death occurred some days
ago at his residence, Emly, of Mr.
James Phelan. Deceased, who had
attained the advanced age of 83,
was the last survivor of one of the
oldest families in the district, and
his death marks the severance of
the last link between the parish of
Emly and one of its most long-
established and highly respected
families.

The late Mr. Phelan carried on a
large-scale and extensive carpen-
tering business at Emly and was
regarded as a first-class tradesman.
He contributed a great deal of his
work to the building of St. Ailbe's
Parish Church, Emly. He was
cousin of Mr. Michael Quane, N.T.,
Dublin, who is the only relative of
the deceased, and was nephew of
the late Daniel Quinn, who was
prominently identified with the
Fenian movement.

The interment took place in Emly
Cemetery.
