EX-SERVICEMEN AS GUARD OF HONOUR

The death of Mr. Michael Hayes, New Road, Rathkeale, which occurred in a Limerick hospital on the 17th inst., caused a terrible shock when the sad news reached his native town. Taken in manhood's prime, his death is a severe blow to his widowed mother, and to her and the other members of the family general sympathy is extended in their sorrow. Deceased, responding to the call, joined the Regular Army for the period of the Emergency. Of buoyant and cheerful disposition, he was an efficient soldier, who had the confidence of his commanding officers and was beloved by his comrades.

The remains were removed to St. Mary's Church, Rathkeale, on Tuesday evening and the funeral, which was very large, took place to the adjoining cemetery on Wednesday. The coffin, draped in the National Flag, was borne on the shoulders of members of the National Federation of Irish Ex-Servicemen, who also formed a guard of honour at the graveside.

The prayers were read by Rev. T. Costello, C.C., and Rev. G. Enright, C.C. After the grave was closed in and the green turf laid on a bugler from the National Army sounded the Last Post.
