The Justice decided to hear the evidence of the complainant, who stated that defendant was tenant of the premises as weekly tenant at the weekly rent of 2/6 and that while he (plaintiff) was absent in England for the past eight years, the defendant paid him no rent.

On defendant asserting that he had instructed Mr. Bennett, solr., to appear in the matter, the Justice adjourned the case to January, so that he may hear any legal argument to be put forward by the defence.

KNOCKED DOWN BY MOTOR VAN

As the result of injuries received when knocked down by a motor van near his home on St. Stephen's Night, Mr. Charles Roeslen, 29 Elm Park, Ennis Road, died in Barrington's Hospital on Saturday night.

The deceased, who was a German by birth, came to this country about thirty years ago. For some years he conducted a hotel for himself in Tipperary and having disposed of this he came to Limerick some 20 years ago as chef, first for the George Hotel and later for Cruise's Hotel. He was married to a Limerick lady—Miss Glynn—who is the recipient of numerous messages of sympathy in her great bereavement.

The late Mr. Roeslen was a very popular figure and was held in very high esteem by the general public. An inquest will be held to-morrow.

DEATH OF MR. WILLIAM WHITE

We regret to announce the death of Mr. William White, 13 Caledonian Place, Limerick, which took place on St. Stephen's Day.
