CAUSED BY POT OF TEA

At an inquest held in Barrington's Hospital this evening by Mr. J. S. McNeice, solr., Deputy Coroner for the city, touching the circumstances of the death of a child, a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony was returned.

The child, Kathleen Ryan, aged 2½ years, lived with her parents at 9, St. Munchin Street, Island Field. On Saturday morning a pot of tea fell on the child, causing severe scalding to the head and neck. It was rushed to Barrington's Hospital, where death took place later in the day.

Dr. Frank Crowe, House Surgeon, described the injuries sustained by the child and said that death was due to asphyxia, following oedema of the windpipe.

OVER 1,500 MILES PER HOUR

The United States Government is engaged with several private aircraft engine companies "in seeking a workable method of using atomic power for the propulsion of aircraft." This was stated in Boston by Major General Curtis E. Lemay, who added that experiments were in progress with a new 'plane "expected to fly at a speed near 1,500 miles an hour at an altitude of 80,000 feet," or over 15 miles.
