A little boy named Patrick Coll, 12 Taylor street, Limerick, is in a critical condition in Barrington's Hospital, having fallen from a window in his home. The child was rushed to hospital after the accident and is suffering from very severe

injuries. He fell from the top window to a

two storeyed house.

It appears that about three o'clock on Saturday the deceased's mother was after removing the boy from the pram in order to allow a younges shild of hers to sleep. Subsequently the boy strayed away and went into a house, which was formerly occupied by his aunt, in Benson's Lane, and which is now only partially occupied in the top storey by a family.

The youngster crapt up the stairs, went to a frameless window three inches from the room floor, over balanced and toppled to the footpath. He sustained savers head injuries and was profusely bleeding from the temple when removed to Barrington's Hospital, where he succumbed to his injuries.

child to the effect that she took deceased
and another child down to I Benson's Lane
in a pram to visit their grandmother; she
took deceased out of the pram to allow the
other child to sleep; the house from which

the child fell was a condemned one, and

the upper window from which deceased fell had neither glass or a frame, and was only 3½ inches from the level of the landing.

A verdict in accordance with the medical testimony was returned, that deceased had

testimony was returned, that deceased had died from shock and haemorhage, caused by extensive fracture of the skull.
