In young store cattle section a useful entry and class, promising young cattle with condition met a firm selling trade, and well bred two year old bullocks and heifers of the right stamp enquired for, with prices slightly firmer; lots showing quality and condition readily cashed, thin and plain types hard to negotiate. Yearlings, 16 to £7 5s. Sheep—Full average reasonable supply, entry showed an increase on last market a particularly good show of mutton; strong attendance. Buyers showed a favourable business disposition for prime pens, and were quite willing to part full values.
