The death last week of Mr. James
Quigley, Rossa Villa, Garryowen,
removed a member of the first
Volunteer Corps formed in Lime-
rick. During the Black and Tan
terror he carried many important
despatches. He was arrested and
interned in Frongoch, where one of
his fellow internees was Mr. W. T.
Cosgrave, later President of the
Executive Council of Saorstát
Éireann. The deceased was em-
ployed on the clerical staff of
Messrs. J. McMahon and Sons, and
was held in high esteem by his
employers and his colleagues. A
man of high ideals and integrity,
he enjoyed the confidence and re-
spect of all who knew him. His
funeral on Saturday last to Mount
St. Lawrence Cemetery was large
and very representative.
