### MR. THOMAS HICKEY, KILMACOW, KILFINNY.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Thomas Hickey, P.C., Kilmacow House, Kilfinny, which took place at his residence on Friday morning, the 10th inst. (writes our Croom correspondent). The deceased gentleman was an extensive farmer and a very popular figure. For many years prior to his death he had been Chairman of Kilfinny Co-operative Creamery, to which responsible position he was elected in succession to his father, and his death at the age of 75 years has occasioned widespread regret. He was a well-known breeder of Irish dairy shorthorns and the excellence of his pedigree stock was widely known.

The late Mr. Hickey was a kindly neighbour, a model father, and an exemplary Christian, whose kindly counsel and pleasant companionship were much sought after.

The remains were removed from Kilmacow on Friday evening to Ballingarry Church, and on Saturday the interment took place in Kilfinny Burial Ground, amidst many manifestations of genuine regret and sorrow.

his, the letter continued, would only apply to the semi-finals and finals of the county in these championships, and the letter asked the support of the Eastern Board Clubs in this motion at the County Convention.

The Chairman thought that they would be unwise in supporting any motion that might affect the status of the East Board, which they had started a few years ago, and had now been fairly well established.

Father Gilmartin thought that the motion would not affect the Board very much, as it would deal only with county semi-finals and finals, but he thought that it might cause trouble in objections and unnecessary delay.

Mr. Ryan (Cappamore) thought that the motion really affected the County Board, who had control of semi-finals and finals.

The Secretary said that such a motion, if carried, would reduce the status of the Divisional Boards, as they would be subject to such a Junior Board.

Mr. Ryan (Murroe) said that no arguments had been forthcoming in favour of such a Board, and in the absence of such arguments the convention could not decide definitely for or against the motion.

It was decided to leave the matter to the respective clubs in the East to vote for or against it at the County Convention, after having heard the arguments in favour of it at that convention.

### MOTION TO RE-GROUP DIVISIONS.

The Chairman said that the Caherline club would have a motion before the County Convention concerning the re-grouping of the divisions in the county. In the West they had more clubs than the South and East put together, and he thought that the county should be re-organised, so as to give the East some teams from the South, and the South in turn some teams from the West.

Mr. Fitzgerald (Caherline) said that the South, East and City Junior Boards were all in East Limerick, and the West had only one Board to deal with the whole of West Limerick.

Father Gilmartin said that it was a good motion, and one that deserved support, and with this the Chairman agreed.

It was unanimously decided to support the motion at the County Convention.

Sympathy was voted to the Gaels of Cappamore on the death of Rev. Father Moloney, P.P., Cappamore, who, the Chairman said, was a trojan worker in the cause of the G.A.A.

In concluding the meeting, the Chairman thanked Mr. McCormack for the use of his hall to hold the meeting, and the Press representative for attending the meeting.

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
