FORMER D.M.P. ATHLETE PASSES

The death has occurred of Mr. Maurice Woulfe, ex-D.M.P., who passed away on Tuesday, at the residence of his nephew, Mr. John Woulfe, Dunganville, Ardagh (writes our Newcastle West correspondent). Deceased, who belonged to a well-known and esteemed West Limerick family, was for ever forty years a member of the Dublin Metropolitan Police. He was in his day a well-known athlete, and a leading exponent of the tug-o'-war game.

Mr. Woulfe served from 1891 until 1920, when he retired on pension. Standing over 6 feet 6½ inches and weighing about 22 stone, he was one of the most powerful men in the D.M.P. In those days he was a prominent athlete, being for many years a member of the D.M.P. tug-of-war team which won the world's championship in the late 'nineties of the last century. He was also well-known as a weight-thrower.

He is survived by a brother, Mr. T. Woulfe, farmer, Ballyine, Newcastle West. The remains were removed to Newcastle West Church, and the funeral took place on Thursday to Grange Cemetery.
