## PLAYED BIG PART

### IN MOVEMENT FOR IRISH INDEPENDENCE

West Limerick (writes our Newcastle West correspondent) has lost one of its oldest and most sterling nationalists by the death of Mr. Michael J. Dore, Balliston House, Shanagolden, who passed away on Monday morning at the age of 77 years and after a brief illness. A life-long supporter of the independence movement, deceased was chairman of the original Glin branch of the Land League, and as a result of his activities in that organisation the tenancy of his holding was retained specially by the landlord. Later, on the amalgamation of Glin district with Listowel, he became a member of the Listowel Board of Guardians, from which he resigned shortly afterwards on becoming associated with the Sinn Fein movement. In 1914 he was sworn in by the late Con Colbert as a member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood. On Easter Monday, 1916, he left his home in an attempt to get to Dublin for the Rising, but owing to the dislocation of train services he only succeeded in getting as far as Sallins. During the Black and Tan War he was a Justice of the Peace for the Sinn Fein Court in West Limerick, while his home at Balliston was main headquarters for the West Limerick Brigade, I.R.A. During this period the late Sean Treacy and J. J. Hogan found refuge in his home after the historic Knocklong Ambush, while General Lucas, after his capture by the I.R.A. in 1921, was held prisoner in the house for ten days before being transferred across the Shannon to Clare. Deceased was a close personal friend of Sean MacDermott and Liam Mellows, and after the Rising several of the 1916 leaders, including Senator Staines, found a welcome refuge in his home. One of the most progressive farmers in his district, the late Mr. Dore belonged to one of the oldest and most esteemed families in West Limerick. He is survived by his widow, two sons and four daughters. He was father of Mr. Michael J. K. Dore, solicitor, M.C.C., Newcastle West, Chairman of the Limerick Mental Hospital Board, and brother-in-law of Mr. Eamonn Dore, Limerick, a member of the 1916 G.P.O. garrison. At the time of the Treaty division deceased supported the Republican cause and was an active supporter of the Fianna Fail Party up to the time of his demise. West Limerick paid a striking tribute to the memory of deceased at the funeral, which took place on Wednesday from Kilcoleman Parish Church to Glin Cemetery.
