HIS LAST FILM.
Brefni O'Rourke's last picture, "The Root of All Evil," is climaxed by a big oil refinery blaze, which was filmed on location in England. Brefni was one of the first of the Irish actors to establish himself in films; his character studies always won the approval of the critics. His unexpected death occurred before "The Root of All Evil" was completed, but director Brock Williams was able to finish the picture without recasting. Phyllis Calvert, Michael Rennie, John McCullum and Hazel Court are starred in this picture.

LESLIE GILLIAT FOR SOUTH SEAS.
Leslie Gilliat, who spent some time in Ireland last year as location manager for the film unit working on "Captain Boycott," has left London for the South Seas to select a site for the filming of H. de Vere Stacpoole's novel "The Blue Lagoon." It is probable that one of the Fiji Islands will be selected. "The Blue Lagoon" will be the first technicolor production of Individual Pictures, producers of "I See A Dark Stranger" and "Captain Boycott." Jean Simmons, who will be seen here soon in "Hungry Hill" and "Great Expectations," has been cast for the picture, and at least one well-known Irish actor has been invited to take a starring role.

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CAUSE OF CRASH

Motorist Who Dozed "Lift" To A Hurling Momentarily

OWNER OF HOUSE TO BE COMPENSATED

At Adare Court on Tuesday last, before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J., Peter Fitzgerald, Mondellihy, Adare, was charged with driving a motor car in a manner dangerous to the public.

Supt. Cooney, Adare, prosecuted, and Mr. A. Blood-Smyth, solicitor, defended.

Patrick Conway, Patrickwell, said that while asleep in his cottage on the night of January 8th last, he was aroused by a crash outside. He went out and saw a man and a car. Asked if there was anything wrong, the man said:—"Not much." Witness, however, noticed the mud-guard of the car bent and the wall of the house cracked, apparently where the car struck it.

Replying to Mr. Blood-Smyth, witness said he was in bed when he heard the crash and didn't see what happened.

Garda J. Walsh gave evidence of interviewing the defendant after the accident. The defendant gave him a statement, written and signed by himself, according to which the defendant was on his way home from Limerick on the night of the alleged offence. While passing through Patrickwell he dozed momentarily; the car swerved, and when he endeavoured to straighten it out it struck a telegraph pole, turned around and crashed into Conway's house. He was travelling at about ten miles an hour when the accident occurred.

Mr. Blood-Smyth submitted that the degree of dangerousness should be tested by the amount of traffic on the road at the time of the crash. At four o'clock in the morning there would be no traffic through Patrickwell. Fitzgerald was willing to compensate fully for the damage caused to the house. The Justice dismissed the charge under the Probation of Offenders' Act, and ordered the defendant to compensate the owner of the house for the damage done, and to pay Conway 5/- expenses.

ADARE COURT

"Lift" To A Hurling Match

PASSENGERS TAKEN ON LORRY

At Adare Court on Tuesday last, before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J., James Murray, Adare, was charged with a breach of the licensing laws.

Supt. Cooney prosecuted and the defendant was not professionally represented.

Sergt. John Reidy, Adare, said that at 6.57 o'clock on the evening of November 10th last, he inspected the premises of the defendant and found one "local" in the yard at the back, and four other non-bona fide customers consuming stout in a room on the premises.

Replying to the defendant, witness said that there was a hurling match in Adare on the occasion. With the exception of the men found on the premises, the shop was clear.

The defendant, in evidence, said that the day of the offence was the occasion of a hurling match at Adare. The men found by Sergt. Reidy came into the bar with a number of bona-fide travellers. Witness was serving in the bar proper, and the men found by the Sergeant were in "the auxiliary bar" unknown to him.

Replying to the Superintendent, witness said he did not deny that the men were found on the premises or that they had been drinking after hours.

The Justice imposed a fine of £2 on the publican and fined the men found on the premises 2/6 each.

PASSENGERS IN MOTOR TRUCK.

Timothy Madden, Kishikirk, Caherinish, was prosecuted by Supt. Cooney for having carried a number of passengers in a motor truck on November 17th last. Michael Lynch, Old Windmill Road, Limerick, the owner of the lorry driven by Madden, was also charged in connection with the offence.

Both defendants appeared in Court. They were not professionally represented.

Garda E. Breen, Adare, swore that on the occasion of a hurling match at Adare, on November 17th last, he held up Madden, who was driving a lorry owned by Lynch. The lorry carried nine passengers and Madden had two young children in front with himself. Madden explained that he had got permission from Sergeant Connolly, Limerick, to carry the passengers to Adare. On subsequent investigation witness found that this was not true.

NO CHARGE FOR USE OF LORRY.

In evidence, Madden said he was employed by Lynch, who, on the occasion mentioned, loaned him his two-ton lorry and a gallon of petrol to take some pals of his to the hurling match at Adare. Lynch had not charged him for the use of the lorry, and he, in turn, did not charge the passengers for the "lift" to the match. A man named John Farrell, of the Yarmouth Fish Store, told witness that he had been speaking to Sergeant Connolly, of William Street Garda Station, Limerick, who gave permission to use the lorry to carry passengers to Adare.

Supt. Cooney—The sergeant cannot give such permission. Lynch swore that he loaned Madden his lorry on the occasion of the hurling match in Adare. He did not charge Madden for the use of the lorry. He thought he was doing nothing wrong in letting Madden have the lorry on the occasion.

The Justice fined the defendants 5/- each.

NOXIOUS WEEDS ACT.

Prosecuted by the Minister for Agriculture for breaches of the Noxious Weeds Act, Maurice Griffin, Ballyduane, Mungret, and Rebecca McNamara, Rathmeale, Mungret, were each fined 10/-.

Mr. Maurice M. Power, solr. (State Solicitor's Office), prosecuted.
