A settlement for £900 with costs was announced to Mr. Justice Haugh in the High Court, Dublin, yesterday, in an action in which Maurice Lyons, Kilconlea, Abbeyfeale, Co. Limerick, and John Roche, Kilmanihan, Co. Kerry, were sued by Stephen Leahy, labourer, Neenovoughane, Brosna, Co. Kerry, for damages for personal injuries. Plaintiff's civil bill alleged that he was struck by a lorry owned by Lyons and driven by Roche at Loughfouder Bog, Kerry, on 4th of October last.

STREET CROSSINGS.
