Shipping at the port has been unusually slack during the past month. As a matter of fact, not as much as one vessel docked here since 29th January. That, surely, is bad, very bad. Something has got to be done-and done now-to revive the trade of the port. A short time ago there was an indication of a renewal of shipping to some extent with Limerick, but it would now seem that the hopes then aroused were not justified; they were certainly premature. But the present state of stagnation cannot be allowed continue. The Harbour Board, we readily admit, are fully aware of the seriousness of the situation. They are doing their best to revitalise the port, as it were, but this will be achieved with greater speed if all who should be interested in its prosperity give full co-operation.
