LIMERICK CATTLE MARKET.

WEEKLY MARKET, SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 22nd.

Dairy cows and heifers. In spite of adverse weather conditions, especially slippery roads, the entry showed a good increase on last market, mostly heifers; dairy cows are scarce, the heifers being more in favour at the present time. There was quite a good attendance of buyers, and bidding for the better quality heifers was satisfactory, most of the good heifers being sold. Top price in this department went to Mr. Michael Liddy, New Lawn, O'Callaghan's Mills, at £27, the runner-up being Mr. John McMahon, Ballyfinnane, at £25 5s. Quite a number of heifers were sold at £25. Judging by today's trade it is quite evident that with the return of normal weather conditions the demand for all classes will steadily improve. In calf and caived heifers, best, £25 5s. to £27; seconds, £23 15s. to £25; others, £21 5s. to £23 10s.; small, £18 5s. to £20; incalf and caived cows, £21 5s. to £25; seconds, £16 to £20.

Stores, a substantially increased entry with many drafts of useful store cattle and more strong cattle than at recent markets. Trade was very dull, the stoppage of train services had a damaging effect, a considerable portion of the entry failed to clear, as buyers were not prepared to make concessions when in normal conditions prices would be showing an advance at this time of the year.
