HAY GOING TO HIGH PRICES

The scarcity of fodder for cattle prevailing in South Limerick now after a really severe winter, is reflected in the very keen prices prevailing for hay in the district (writes our Bruff correspondent). In Dromin one vendor obtained as much as £10 per ton for hay for fodder, while in other districts, further west of Dromin, the very high price of £12 per ton is prevailing. This is the highest price paid at this time of the year for hay in many years.

Sheep—slight increase, and a better turnout. Strong attendance of buyers, trade was firm and steady; prime sheep being freely bid for, and last week's rates easily maintained; full prices paid for finished sheep; medium weights also in brisk demand, anything with condition and quality had buyers. All round enquiry well sustained, with a healthy tone, offers firm and ready for the best pens, and good support for useful well fed wethers, buyers operating freely. Fresh ewes sold well. Market well supported with an early finish and practical clearance.
