WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, April 8th Full normal seasonal supply, general description not as good as recent weeks, which naturally affected prices. There was a number of secondary heifers on sale, which did not appeal to buyers; these were tedious and difficult to place. Newly bred, promising, soft heifers were wanted and bid for, and made full current rates; customers were present wanting "sizey" heifers, with the required recommendations for dairy purposes, and willing to give best rates and full value. More of this class were looked for. Plenty of buyers wanting thick, soft heifers, which were readily bid for, and always in demand; lack of evenness in size and quality of the entries means that prices follow an uneven groove, and business consequently lacks the "swing" it otherwise would have. Dairy cows met a good enquiry, but it is too early to overdo the market; demand for young cows with substance and quality; this class is scarce. Trade generally worked out on the lines of last week. Sufficient buyers to take all the useful lots, and where quality, condition and promise featured, no difficulty in exchange, on rates around the basis of recent markets. Mr. Richard Shanahan, Carheen, Kildimo, topped the market with a beautifully brought out and typical dairy heifer, at 43 10s., the purchaser being Mr. C. Hogan, Croom. The same owner also obtained 38 10s. Top price for dairy cows went to Mrs. Hastings, Friarstown House, Limerick, at 46 and 43 10s. for two really outstanding cows, the purchaser being in both cases Mr. C. Costelloe, Corcamore, Clarina. In calf and calved heifers, best, 35 10s. to 43 10s.; promising, 28 5s. to 34 10s.; ordinary, 20 to 27 10s.; small and backward, 14 to 18. Dairy cows, choice, 43 10s. to 46; promising, 25 10s. to 27 5s.; ordinary, 17 5s. to 22 5s.—Wm. B. Fitt & Co., Auctioneers.

WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, April 9th—Cattle—larger dimensions, and a much better show than last week; strong attendance of buyers; beef in firm demand at full rates. Prime heifers and bullocks readily placed at slightly dearer rates; suitable fat cattle, especially heifers, moved out freely, with appreciable competition for prime heifers; well bred heiferish cows, not too heavy, in good request, and easily cashed at late rates. Small supply of cows, suitable for canning. These met a quiet market. Strong forward bullocks changed hands readily at full recent currencies, and best grades readily cashed. The beef section of the market finished up satisfactorily, with a complete clearance almost effected. Mr. C. S. Barry, Coolrairie House, Ennis Road, Limerick, topped the market at 51 and 50 for heifers, the purchaser being in both cases Mr. James Joyce, Thomondgate, Limerick, and also had the remarkable average for his draft of 8 heifers of 47 6s. The heaviest entry of store cattle for some considerable time, and included many drafts of choice feeding bullocks and dairy heifers; trade in this department was somewhat slower than last week, and sales not as readily negotiated. The right stamp of feeding bullocks and choice colour dairy heifers, for which there was enquiry, and those with colour, quality and condition, met competition, and found buyers at full recent rates. Trade moved steadily for promising feeders, recent currencies maintained, but secondary sorts and those lacking condition met a much quieter market. Choice yearlings a steady trade; a substantial turnover, and most satisfactory clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, 42 10s. to 51; second run, 34 10s. to 40; small, 26 to 31 15s. Fat cows, best, 37 10s. to 40; second run, 24 10s. to 31 10s. Old, 17 to 20 10s. Three year old bullocks and heifers, 27 5s. to 31 10s.; second run, 20 10s. to 25 10s. Two year old bullocks and heifers, 17 to 24 15s.; second run, 13 5s. to 18; others, 9 to 12 15s. Yearlings, best, 10 12s. 6d. to 13 10s.; second run, 16 10s. to 10 5s. Sheep—Supplies showed a slight decrease, a fairly useful turnout of mutton, but not many pens of prime sheep; buyers showed a favourable business disposition, and were quite willing to part at full values; a firm tone ruled, with a ready repetition of recent top rates, and in the case of prime sheep in favour of vendors. Well fed wethers and hoggets with quality in brisk demand, and good small sheep found favour at late rates. Young ewes sold well, all round active demand for suitable sheep. Market easily sold up with a strong finish. Mr. H. Hunt, Ballinvirick, Askeaton, obtained the record price of 11 18s. for a pen of 12 wethers, and also 11 15s. for a second pen, the purchaser being in both cases Mr. Morgan O'Brien, Knocklong, Mr. John Ryan, Cloonacorney, Broadford, Co. Clare, obtained 11 13s. for 7 wethers, the purchaser being Mr. Daniel Barry, Lock Quay, Limerick.
