NONAGENARIAN EXILE'S DEATH

The death has taken place at Nashua, New Hampshire, U.S.A., of Mrs. Hannah T. Quigley (nee Toomey), a native of Graigue, Castletown, where she was born in 1856 (writes our Ballyagran correspondent). She was sister of the late Mr. Michael Toomey, Graigue, and aunt of Mr. David Toomey, of the same address. She emigrated close on seventy years ago and was a resident of Nashua for 65 years. Despite her great age, she had a remarkably keen intellect, and up to the time of her death, retained vivid memories of her girlhood days in Castletown. The burial took place in St. Patrick's Cemetery, Hudson, Solemn Requiem Mass having been celebrated in St. Patrick's Church.
