## LITTLE GIRL'S DEATH

### FATALLY INJURED BY LORRY

Mr. M. E. Cussen, solr., Coroner for West Limerick, opened an inquest on Friday evening last into the circumstances connected with the death of Mary Collum, 6½ years, daughter of Mr. William and Mrs. Collum, Knockaderry, Newcastle West. She died on the previous evening from injuries received when struck by a motor lorry at Kiltanna.

The little girl was coming from school with two other children. The three called at a house on the roadside and it appears that the deceased ran out on to the roadway in front of the lorry. She received extensive injuries and death is believed to have occurred in a very short time.

At the inquest evidence of identification was given by the deceased's father and medical testimony was given by Dr. Nora and Dr. Michael O'Connor, Newcastle West, who held a post-mortem.

Supt. M. McKenna, who represented the Garda, applied for an adjournment of the inquest sine die, pending investigations and a report from the Attorney-General.

The inquest was adjourned after the Coroner, Supt. McKenna and the foreman of the jury had expressed sincere sympathy with the parents of the deceased child.
