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## CHOKED BY ROPE

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### YOUTH ACCIDENTALLY HANGED

Patrick Carey, seventeen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Carey, Rutagh, Herbertstown, met his death under very tragic circumstances while erecting a swing for children at his employer's home in Herbertstown on Sunday last.

Carey, it appears, was tying a rope from the rafters of a cowshed to be used as a swing, during which he was playfully pretending to be hanging himself by tying the rope round his neck, when he slipped forward. The coil of rope round his neck, it appears, tightened and choked him. He died almost immediately.

At an inquest conducted by Dr. John P. Cleary, Hospital, Coroner for East Limerick, the jury brought in a verdict of death by strangulation as a result of accidental hanging.

The Coroner expressed sympathy with the parents of the deceased youth, and Dr. Mullane-Power, Supt. Dunning, on behalf of the Gardai, and Mr. P. Barry, foreman of the jury, associated themselves with the Coroner's expression of sympathy.
