Deceased, who had been stationed at College Street Garda Barracks, Dublin, was a native of Knocklong, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Healy, Lackelly, Knocklong. The late Garda Healy had only twelve months service with the Garda Force and the news of his death came as a great shock to his family, relatives and friends.

His remains were removed from Richmond Hospital, Dublin, to Emly Parish Church, and the interment took place in Castlejane Cemetery, after Office and Requiem Mass. A large number of Gardai, drawn from a number of stations in the district, formed a guard of honour at the graveside.
