DEATH FROM SUNSTROKE

Returning from work in a local
bog, Matthew O'Connell (17), who
worked for his brother, T. J. O'Con-
nell, Coolready, Castleconnell, com-
plained of the heat and decided to
immerse his head in a barrel of
water. He was discovered a short
time afterwards lying unconscious
in the yard and died a few hours
later, having received medical and
spiritual aid. Sunstroke was stated
to be the cause of his death, and
an inquest was not considered
necessary.

Deceased was a native of Black-
rock, Cork.
