WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, June 4th—Cattle Entry showed a substantial increase and an excellent show of beef and store cattle; in beef department trade was steady and prime heifers and bullocks sold readily, top rates unhesitatingly paid; handy weights in most favour; buyers in full attendance. Well-fed, heiferish cows a free sale. In this section business showed a healthy tone and brisk competition for prime lots. Secondary cows and older sorts met a steady trade, strong and forward stores and useful feeding bullocks with quality and condition easily cashed. In young store cattle section business showed a healthy, reasonable influence, with a good "take" for nice drafts of feeders, both bullocks and heifers. Brisk selling trade at better rates. Small and thin cattle more easily placed than recent markets. The entry of yearlings included a number of drafts of choice bullocks and heifers. Well-bred, coloury bullocks and heifers were in brisk demand and good second class changed hands. Promising stores sold particularly well at dearer rates. Proceedings in the cattle section were marked with a healthy and firm tone and a readiness on the part of buyers to invest. Good all round selling trade in this section of the market, with a very substantial turn-over and clearance. Sheep—Decrease in numbers, but full entry and a good show. All round trade was quiet, buyers showing a cooler disposition and value position much easier, realisation not as ready. In some cases vendors stood out for recent top rates, which buyers were not willing to concede; previous rates not repeated. Nicely fed wethers and hoggets in most favour, also fresh ewes. When business settled down there was a fair, steady exchange at reduced rates; secondary and rough sheep met a dull trade. Store hoggets not so active. Fat lambs small supply and easier rates. All round trade was quieter and concession necessary to effect exchange; fair clearance.
