To Late Mr. Laffan

**HOSPITAL BOARD
ADJOURNS**

Limerick Mental Hospital Board adjourned its monthly meeting of Saturday last as a mark of respect to the memory of the late Mr. Batt Laffan and as a mark of sympathy with his relatives.

Mr. M. J. K. Dore, solr., Co.C., Chairman, presided at the meeting.

DID GREAT WORK.

Mr. Clohessy proposed that the meeting be adjourned as a mark of respect to the late Mr. Laffan and of sympathy to his relatives. "He did great work for the country and in the interests of this county, and the least tribute we could pay to his memory is to adjourn this meeting as a mark of respect."

Mr. Donegan seconded Mr. Clohessy's proposition.

The Chairman said the meeting was one of a general body of which the late Mr. Laffan was once chairman. There was a great deal due to Mr. Laffan by this country. In this connection he recalled that in the old days the late Mr. Laffan had taken his life in his hands when, immediately after a former Chairman of the County Council had been murdered by enemy forces, he (Mr. Laffan) had stepped into his shoes. He (Chairman) agreed with Mr. Clohessy that the meeting should be adjourned.

Mr. Connery expressed the desire to be associated with the remarks of the Chairman and with the proposition of Mr. Clohessy. While Mr. Laffan had done a lot of good work for the county, he had also done a tremendous amount for Limerick City.

**ALWAYS IN FRONT LINE
TRENCHES.**

Mr. Donegan endorsed the remarks of the Chairman, and said Mr. Laffan had always been in the front line of trenches. Mr. Donegan said: "He was never afraid to come before the people and say what he thought was right and just. I would say it will be very hard to replace a man like Mr. Laffan."

Mr. Hayes joined in the expression of regret at Mr. Laffan's death and thought that the only form of proper recognition which the Board could give his memory was by adjourning its meeting that day.

Mr. O'Malley, the Manager, Mr. Dillon and the other members associated themselves with the expressions of regret at the death of Mr. Laffan and of sympathy with his relatives.

The vote of sympathy was passed in silence and the meeting adjourned until Wednesday.

**And Treatment Of
Catholics**

POSITION IN SIX COUNTIES

Major Geoffrey Bing, Labour M.P. for Hornchurch (England), who is at present in Belfast collecting material for the forthcoming debate in Westminster on the "Northern Ireland" Bill, made an important statement to-day to the Press.

Major Bing stated that he could find no support for the statement made by Sir Basil Brooke that 99 per cent. of the Catholics in "Northern Ireland" were disloyal.

He was convinced, Major Bing said, that the economic troubles of "Northern Ireland" could not be solved so long as there was no real democracy in the Six Counties; so long as Catholics believed that they were not being fairly treated; so long as all sections of the community were not given equal opportunities to participate in the Government.

Major Bing condemned the speeches made by Sir Basil Brooke, in which he had advocated the boycotting of Catholics. These speeches were, he said, most insulting to hundreds of thousands of Catholics who had fought in the war in different armies.

**FLYING BOATS
AGAIN**

**FOYNES MAY COME INTO ITS
OWN**

The flying boats are likely to come back and Foynes may come into its own again. This is the effect of a statement made by Air Commodore Herbert Brackley, Assistant to the Chairman of the British Overseas Airways Corporation, when he passed through Shannon Airport last evening.

The Air Commodore was on his way back from New York on the B.O.A.C. Constellation Balmoral. "We will," he said, "be probably coming back on the North Atlantic with flying boats one of these days and you in Eire will be pointing out the advantages of operating through Shannon. I myself had a great deal to do with the selection of the site and the establishment of the old flying-boat base at Foynes, and it could hardly be bettered. When we build our new Saunders 45 and equip it with jets, we will have the fastest and most luxurious flying-boat in the world."
