RESTRICTION ON USE OF CREAM

An Order, which will take effect as from Monday next, has been made by the Minister for Agriculture prohibiting the use of cream for purposes other than butter-making. The Order also makes it illegal for any person to have cream in his or her possession, other than the proprietor of premises registered in the Register of Creameries or the Register of Cream - Separating Stations kept under the Dairy Produce Act, 1924; a person who obtains cream from milk from his own cows; or a person who, during the whole of the year 1946, was engaged in the business of manufacturing butter.
