INCREASE OF 50 PER CENT.

Following consultations between the I.T. & G.W. Union and the Department of Health, extending over the past three months, the Minister for Health and Social Welfare has authorised an increase of 50 per cent. in the salaries of the staffs of Mental Hospitals.

DEARER PETROL

Petrol in the Twenty-Six Counties has been increased by 2½d. per gallon on and from to-day. The Minister for Industry and Commerce has made an order to this effect "owing to increased costs." The new price is 2/3 in Dublin City and 2/4½ in the provinces.

The strike threatened by Ennis cleansing staff has been deferred until August 1st, to permit of the facts being reported to the headquarters of the I.T. and G.W.U. to ensure official sanction for the strike against a "contemptuous increase of one penny per day" for six members of the staff.

PURCHASE OF MOTOR CARS

At the Dublin District Court to-day a young man named Bernard Flood, living at Upper Sheriff St., Dublin, was charged with exporting motor cars contrary to Emergency Powers Orders.

It was stated by prosecuting counsel that the defendant exported four V8 Ford cars and one Chrysler. The Ford cars were bought in Limerick and Ballinasloe and the Chrysler in Nenagh. All the cars were sent to Northern Ireland.

TURF HAULAGE HIT BY PETROL SHORTAGE.

The haulage of turf in Clare has been brought almost to a standstill by a shortage of petrol in the county. Lorries in many parts of the county are idle, and the position shows no signs of improvement according to the petrol suppliers. Last evening all garages in Ennis, with the exception of one which had a few hours supply, were dry. Hackney drivers are particularly hard hit by the shortage.

ADDED WATER

For selling whiskey which, according to the analyst's certificate, contained 10 per cent. of added water, Timothy Murphy, publican, 83 Rock Street, Tralee, was fined £2, plus 26/- costs, at Tralee Court.

Instead of doing so he wrote a note to Mr. I. M. Houlihan, solr., stating he would not attend and returned the viaticum. In a telephone conversation with Mr. Houlihan on the night before the sitting of the Court, he said to tell the judge he had flu.
